LETTER FROM THE FRONT

Update from Pamplin Historical Park

Does anyone remember who Ellsworth (Babe) Dahlgren was? Probably not. On May 2, 1939, Dahlgren was surprised to learn that his name had been inserted into the starting lineup as the first baseman for the New York Yankees, thus ending Hall of Famer Lou Gehrig's 2,130 consecutive game streak. Imagine the nerves and sense of great responsibility that Dahlgren shouldered that day. I know how he must have felt. On April 3rd of this year I took over as the second Executive Director of Pamplin Historic Park, replacing A. Wilson Greene, a Civil War preservationist and historian Hall of Famer if there ever was one. Over the course of twenty-two years, Will, in partnership with the Pamplin Foundation, created the finest Civil War Museum and Park in the country.

Those are big shoes to fill but I am confident that things will turn out o.k. for this is not my first time up to bat. I have now been in the museum business for twenty-five years following a teaching career in the northern tundra region of the great State of Maine. In 1991 I moved south to study the American Civil War (since most of the conflict was hosted in this region - there are no battlefields in Maine). Since then I have held just about every possible museum job including serving as curator, education director, exhibit designer, newsletter editor, archivist, director and have swept out the floors after closing from time to time.

Pamplin Historic Park is a wonderful place, staffed by professionals who take pride in working on this hallowed ground. The bottom line is we promise to keep the place running at the same high standards of excellence set by the previous administration. By the way, how did "Babe" Dahlgren do on May 2, 1939 after replacing a legend at first base? His first time up in the third inning, he hit a homerun. That happens sometimes when you keep your eye on the ball.

Park Programs & Exhibits




One of the signature features of our award-winning exhibit "Duty Called Me Here: The Common Soldier in the American Civil War" is the audio component. Visitors are given a headset and an MP3 player as they enter the exhibit. As they travel through the seven themed galleries they can listen to automatically triggered messages and choose from random access stops throughout the museum and the outside park. This late 20th century technology has worked quite well over the past 18 years. However, the company that sold us this application in 1998 no longer supports it. It has become obsolete.



In the summer of 2017, Pamplin Historic Park will be introducing a new, up-to-date audio and video system produced by Orpheo, a multi-media company based in France.

These hand-held devices are currently being used in a variety to places in the United States including the Kennedy Space Center, Grand Central Terminal in New York, the Harley Davidson Museum in Wisconsin and the Elvis Presley Museum in Tennessee. We have purchased two different devices. The Orpheo Micro will be for students who are visited the museum during our spring school tours. The Orpheo Nova is for our daily traffic visitors. Both devices will present the museum's audio programs at over 80 stations in the park. They have extended battery life, are easily programmable, and have high quality sound. The Nova also has a 5 inch color display touch screen which allows us to present images or even videos that match the programming. If our visitors know how to use a Smart Phone or an I-Pad, they will be very comfortable using this new system.



Much of the funding to purchase these devices came from last year' capital campaign. For this, we thank our generous members and supporters. In today's world if you are not investing in new technology, you may be left behind. This is also true in the museum world. If these new devices excite the imagination, spur learning and demonstrate our commitment to our visitors, we think the cost will be worth it.

Featured Items from The Civil War Store

In 2016 one of the goals of the Civil War Store at Pamplin Historical Park was to reach out to the local Virginia arts community. We are now partnered with five artists whose work is carried in the shop and sold on commission. Two of these artists are Chuck and Lisa Mosser, from the Hampton Roads area of Virginia. This creative power couple retired from the corporate world in 1998 to take up woodworking and glass crafting and never looked back.

Lisa Mosser took her first beadwork class in 1994, seeking a creative outlet for stress relief and it quickly became a driving passion:

"The process of melting, shaping, and decorating glass fascinates me. The torch flame transforms the glass from rock hard to clay malleable to honey soft. Experimenting with new glass colors and techniques makes my heart sing each time I fire up the torch."

In her studio she makes a wide variety of items from gorgeous jewelry to office and kitchen utensils. In the Civil War Store we just received a new stock of jewelry in two color collections: rich russet and blue hues that recall the 19th century, and the bright citrus tones of her summer line.

Chuck's woodwork surpasses that of mere utilitarian value into the realm of art. He is drawn to woodworking by the, "sensual pleasure in the smell and feeling of working with wood and the instant gratification of watching shavings fly while seeing the shape appear before me."

We are excited to introduce Cole Elder, our new Student Visitors Service Assistant through Dinwiddie County's 2017 Summer Work-Based Learning Program. Cole will be working at the Park from around July 30th to August 27th. Cole enjoys playing an active role in his school and community. He was the president of his freshman class and remains involved in student government. An avid singer and pianist, Cole has reached semi-finalist level on America's Got Talent and is currently touring as the worship leader of his church band. He aspires to earn a degree in Education or Medicine but has a knack for business. Cole has worked with his mother on several entrepreneurial projects. He aims to launch a Magazine titled Young Success Virginia (YSVA) which would focus on the stories of young entrepreneurs and the role of faith in their life and business.

The Summer Work-Based Learning Program is as part of the larger Dinwiddie County Youth Workforce Development Initiative. This is Pamplin Historical Park's first year as a community partner for the program which aims to provide high school students with the skills and experience that lead to sustainable careers. It does this through collaborative partnerships within the community which allow students to obtain crucial career exposure and marketable skills. Students must be in good academic standing and go through a series of interviews to be admitted into the program. Once accepted they are matched with community partners based on their interests and the partners' specifications.

As a community partner we will provide valuable visitor service, tourism, and museum experience to our student. They will work about two days a week and will earn a stipend from Dinwiddie County. This allows students to hone job skills in their field of interest while still earning as they would in other summer jobs. We are excited for the opportunity to meet and work with Cole and hope to positively contribute to his future career goals.



Members of our volunteer staff received a rare opportunity to tour Eppington Plantation in Chesterfield County, VA. Francis Eppes VI (Thomas Jefferson's brother-in-law) began construction on Eppington in 1768. It has survived the almost 250 years since in a remarkable state of preservation. 




COMING EVENTS

really like for the common Civil War soldier, or explore what life was really like on an authentic 19th century plantation.


